PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Vicki Perrett

It's my pleasure to report that Bellarine Catchment Network (BCN) had a very successful year in 2023–24. BCN has continued to fulfil its purpose as an environmental charity, focused on its strategic goals of activating, engaging and empowering people to care for the environment. In collaboration with our network members and partners, BCN has delivered a wide range of educational activities, bush regeneration and environmental services across the Bellarine and Greater Geelong.

Amongst many worthwhile achievements, I would like to highlight the following programs, projects and outcomes.

- Impactful Network Uppermost is the Network itself. It really is an exemplar model of collaborative environmental conservation. As of June 2024, we have 39 member organisations comprising Landcare, Coastcare, Friends of groups, community groups as well as land managers, local government and authorities. The Network involves over 3400 active volunteers and has nearly 40,000 followers. It's pleasing to see new groups emerging and seeking to join the Network each year. This year, we welcomed the Friends of the Red-capped Plover.
- **Summer Program** The holiday season provides us with a wonderful opportunity to connect with and educate visitors to our region, especially families and children.
- Last summer, through our ongoing partnerships with land managers and Coastcare Victoria, BCN helped deliver the biggest summer program yet.
- Renovation of Bellarine Environment Centre Thanks to a major infrastructure grant (\$350,000) from the City of Greater Geelong, much-needed renovations were achieved at our main facility. A project team including staff and committee expertly managed the works, which were completed on schedule and below budget. Now BCN and BLG staff have a contemporary and accessible work environment. Network members can access the free Community Meeting Room and improvements to storage sheds have streamlined the borrowing of BCN's extensive equipment and resources by members and local community groups.
- Regeneration of Murrk Ngubitj Yarram Yaluk A personal favourite is the partnership project with Barwon Water to regenerate the old Bellarine Basin site.
- As a Friend, it's exciting to observe long-dormant native plants reappearing, once smothering weeds are removed. Bunjil's regular appearances high above us are a special treat. In collaboration with the Wadawurrung Traditional Owners Aboriginal Corporation, our staff and the volunteers, the site's biodiversity is steadily improving.
- Strengthening Partnerships This year BCN collaborated with 12 organisations including: Barwon Water, Barwon Coast, Bellarine Bayside, Bellarine Community Health, Bendigo Bank, Borough of Queenscliffe, City of Greater Geelong, Committee for Geelong, Country Women's Association, Geelong Cemetery Trust, Hive Gallery and Ocean Grove Rotary. BCN is keen to continue strengthening and diversifying these partnerships. We also appreciate our long term partnerships with Bellarine Landcare and the Corangamite Catchment Management Authority.

- Organisational Achievements Hard work by the Leadership Team and the volunteer Committee has delivered the following outcomes:
 - A turnaround from a net loss of \$55,702 last year to an operating profit of \$95,272 this year.
 - An improved balance sheet that will enable BCN to recruit more staff in FY2025.
 - A revised organisational structure that better supports BCN's strategy and growing demands.
 - Valuable business sponsorships from Davidsons, GravIT, and Officeworks Geelong, which have helped reduce operational costs.
- **Networking & Climate Advocacy** BCN's strategy is guided by the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. Network members recognise the urgent need to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in order to stabilise the earth's climate and protect nature.
 - On behalf of the Network, I've participated in briefings and advocacy efforts with local, state, and federal politicians, making submissions on topics such as waste management, circular economy, clean energy, and nature laws.
 - In 2024, BCN became a member of the G21 Sustainability Pillar. I have enjoyed representing the Network at Pillar meetings, the Annual Forum and on the Clean Economy subgroup while Matt has joined the Nature Positive subgroup.

For a small organisation, BCN punches above its weight. Our significant achievements are the result of the considerable expertise, passionate commitment and consistent professionalism of our staff. I would like to thank our wonderful team led by Matt Crawley (Executive Officer) and Naomi Wells (Coastal and Biodiversity Program Leader) plus Daniel Morrison (Biodiversity Field Officer) and Sophie Small (Bellarine Landcare Group's Landcare Facilitator).

ACTING TREASURER'S REPORT


As BCN is now a registered charity, we must comply with the regulations of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC). With a total annual revenue over \$500,000, BCN is classified as a medium charity. The ACNC requires financial statements to be based on the accrual accounting method, not cash, as we've previously used.

Put simply, cash basis accounting records transactions when you pay or receive money, whereas accrual basis accounting records them when you get a bill or raise an invoice. Previously the BCN balance sheet did not include accounts receivable. The accrual method increases our assets by \$20,020 and raises our GST liability by \$1820.


The opinion of the Independent Auditor's Report was positive stating that the financial report gave a true and fair view of BCN's financial position and performance as at 30 June 2024 and complied with the relevant Australian Accounting Standards.

In 2023–24, BCN improved its balance sheet with an increase in equity of \$95,273. This result positions BCN well to appoint more staff in FY2025. Going forward we're confident accrual accounting will provide much a more accurate picture of the organisation's financial position and performance.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

The BCN staff commitment to deliver programs and projects for our Network and partners continued during 2023–24. Continued alignment with our Strategic Plan through projects and partnerships aligning to the goals to Activate, Engage and Empower was a focus for the team.

Team members continued to deliver important projects with new partners including Bellarine Community Health with the Land, Sea and Me program and existing partners such as Geelong Cemeteries Trust with revegetation, school activities and bush regeneration. Our team supports the community through their expertise in community engagement and education, and technical skills across pest plant and animal management, plant identification, and biodiversity protection and enhancement. Along side these technical skills the BCN team supports the community through advice, advocacy, grant applications and delivery.

BCN continued to support and auspice projects for our member and aligned groups, whilst staff members are represented on numerous committee's, reference groups and conference presentations. There are examples of how the team implement core project areas, whilst continuing to reach outwardly and support the community in diverse ways.

This year provided the team with a challenge to deliver more projects and initiatives on reduced staffing hours. This has enabled the Network to plan to meet our growing demands for the 2024–25 year and beyond and expand our staff and resources to meet these growing demands.









Bellarine Environment Centre Upgrade

For the past 10 years, the Bellarine Environment Centre on Swan Bay Road has supported amazing outcomes across Geelong and the Bellarine. With our continually growing network, an upgrade to the facilities at the Bellarine Environment Centre was needed. In early 2023, BCN successfully acquired funding through the City of Greater Geelong's Infrastructure Fund to provide much needed upgrades and updates to the Centre. We are very grateful for the support and funding provided by the City.

This grant enabled us to upgrade the meeting room, kitchen and office spaces making them comfortable and user-friendly for our network. We were able to provide ways to accommodate people with wheelchairs and disabilities through a unisex, all abilities toilet, via an accessible entrance, and disability parking. We also upgraded our storage sheds to allow ease of access for network members to borrow our equipment and resources and have also installed a car port on the property to safely store our community trailers, again for ease and accessibility for our network members.

BCN committee members and staff worked extremely hard to coordinate and manage this construction project and we are grateful for their contribution. The Community Meeting Room has already been used by many Network members, providing a free, accessible and comfortable space that supports many projects and outcomes to help benefit our environment and our community.

We also want to thank Barwon Water for supporting us through the build by allowing us to use their shed at Murrk Ngubitj Yarram Yaluk as a temporary office space for 6

Murrk Ngubitj Yarram Yaluk

In 2023–24, we kicked off our partnership with Barwon Water by continuing to facilitate the monthly 'Friends of Murrk Ngubitj Yarram Yaluk'. In Wadawurrung, this name means 'headwaters of continuous flowering river' and has become a unique opportunity to engage community in the benefit of bush regeneration and biodiversity preservation. Throughout the year, over 150 volunteers have attended these working bees, contributing their time each month to remove 3ha of weeds from this reserve including Red Inkweed, Serrated Tussock, Cats Ears and South African Weed Orchids. Collectively they have contributed over 380 volunteer hours at this site.

This hard work has already paid off through visible and significant regeneration outcomes being observed. Throughout the year, BCN also facilitated additional events with support from Barwon Water including a family-friendly activity over the April school holidays, a 1-year birthday event supported by Barwon Water and numerous site visits for interest groups such as the Geelong Field Naturalists Club.

Each month, BCN also worked alongside the Gobata Dja team from the Wadawurrung Traditional Owners Aboriginal Corporation, continuing to control and manage weeds across the site. Members from BCN's Biodiversity Team have worked hard throughout the year to conserve and improve vegetation biodiversity at this site.

BCN is grateful for the partnership with Barwon Water, and their dedication to preserving and protecting this unique reserve that will soon become a public reserve that all can enjoy.

We would like to deeply thank all the volunteers who have contributed their time at this site – your efforts have lead to significant conservation outcomes and is very appreciated.

Summer Program

During January 2024, BCN had our biggest summer season yet, thanks to the support of our project partners including Barwon Coast, Bellarine Bayside, the Borough of Queenscliffe, Coastcare Victoria and the City of Greater Geelong.
